1. \$200,000 Punitive Damages in Franchise Dispute

In the recent decision in <u>Halligan v. Liberty Tax Service Inc.</u>, 2006 MBQB 75, the court awarded punitive damages of \$200 000 against the franchisor to address the "hardball tactics employed by Liberty in attempting...to bludgeon Halligan into submission." The court states that "punitive damages must be sufficiently significant to bring home to a big franchise operation that egregious breaches of good faith to its franchisees must not be countenanced."
